

# Collaborating for improved women's health:

## The Solomon Islands Standard Treatment Manual for Obstetrics & Gynaecology

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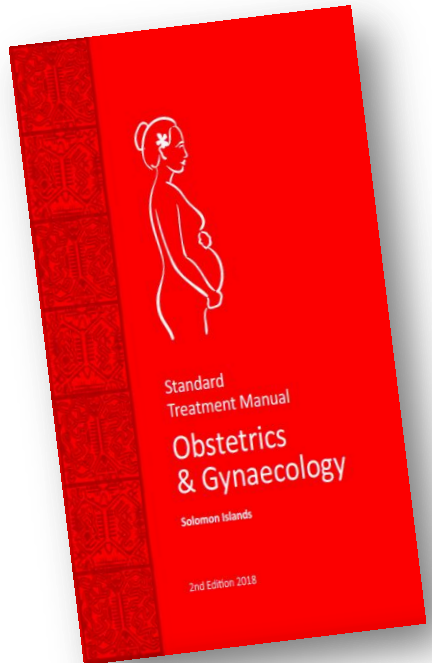
### Background

Standard Treatment Manuals (STM) play an important role in promoting consistency and quality of care, especially in low- and middle-income countries. The Solomon Islands (SI) has a long history of STMs in medicine and paediatrics.

The placement of a volunteer Australian Senior Registrar (SR) in O&G provided an opportunity to develop an STM focussed on women's health.

### Methods

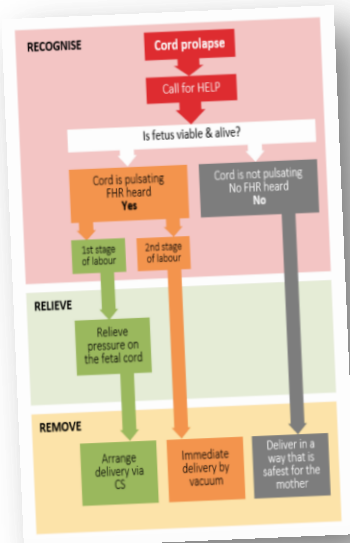
After confirming the need for an O&G STM, a Working Group was formed. This was Chaired by the Head of Department of the National Referral Hospital (NRH) and included the three other SI O&G specialists, the visiting Australian SR, two local registrars and a senior midwife.



The Papua New Guinean STM was used as a template, with each chapter reviewed and updated by a member of the WG. Relevant Fiji, RANZCOG and WHO guidelines were utilised as resources. The visiting SR compiled the chapters and arranged external review, including provincial health workers, two international O&G specialists and the paediatrics and pharmacy departments. RANZCOG provided financial support.

### Results

The O&G STM comprises 200 A6 pages organised into alphabetised chapters. The manual has been endorsed by the Ministry of Health & Medical Services. It will be made available to healthcare workers in all SI provinces using the pharmacy distribution network. An accompanying education program has been developed.



### Conclusion

All SI healthcare workers will shortly have access to a pocket-sided quick-reference guide for important O&G topics. The STM is a positive example of Australian and Pacific colleagues collaborating towards improved women's health.
